

# YOUR CHANCE TO MEET THE CANDIDATES

With nominations for the 2022 Local Body Elections now closed, the Waimate District Council has received a total of 15 nominations for Ward Councillors and two nominations for the Mayoralty.

Of those nominations, two of the four wards received the minimum number, meaning the candidates for the Hakataramea-Waihaorunga Ward and the Pareora-Otaio-Makikihi Ward will be elected unopposed. These candidates are incumbent Councillors Colin Pankhurst, Sandy McAlwee and Tom O'Connor.



while the Lower Waihao Ward has two candidates vying for one vacancy.

Meanwhile, Waimate businessman Rick Stevens will contest the district's Mayoralty, standing against three-term incumbent Craig Rowley. Stevens has also been nominated as a Councillor for the Waimate Ward, along with John Begg, Jonathan Bird, Peter Collins, Julie Dee, Sarah Huggins, Peter Paterson, Tom Williams, Sharvn Cain and Fabia Fox.

Departing Councillors, stepping down at the completion of this term, include Miriam Morton, Sheila Paul and David Owen - all of whom have not sought re-

### **BETTER OFF FUNDING**

As part of the Government's Threee Waters Reform proposals, councils are now being offered Tranche 1 of the \$2 billion Better Off Funding Package. Overall, Waimate District Council has been allocated \$9.68 million, with \$2.42 million available in Tranche 1. Applications for the funding are due on 30 September, however Council has sought an extension from the Department of Internal Affairs (through to the end of November), to make a decision and carry out consultation with the community and stakeholders on whether or not to accept the funding and the potential projects to be included.

## **KUROW BOAT RAMP FUNDING REQUEST**

Council has approved a funding request of \$7,800 to help remodel and extend the boat ramp at the northern end of Kurow Island. The ramp has been described as "not fit for purpose" and according to local police, poses added risk to weekend boat users. Council acknowledged the ramp was widely used by Waimate residents and understood the economic benefits of helping to bring people into the district for recreational purposes. Waitaki District Council were also approached for funding, while Meridian Energy has supported the project to the tune of \$40,000.

## RECREATIONAL TRACK GRANT

In another funding decision, Council has granted \$10,000 to the Whitehorse MTB Riders Group, accepting a grants application as part of the Council's bi-annual Recreational Track Grant. A key part of the project will see the existing dual direction DDT1 trail converted to individual ascending and descending trails. Work is expected to get underway in the coming months.

Casual concession tickets are also available at the registration booths on site at the respective campgrounds. With each season ticket, you will receive an information brochure to help familiarise yourself with the rules, guidelines and expectations.

### PUBLIC MEETING TO ADDRESS NITRATE ISSUES



Early August, Council advised the detection of increased nitrate levels in the water supply of the Lower Waihao Rural Water Scheme (including residents in the Waikakahi East area). For those who may have missed this alert, elevated nitrate levels have the potential to cause health issues, particularly higher risk to pregnant woman and infants under six months of age. Please note, the usual method of boiling water does not remove nitrates.

Council are working closely with Taumata Arowai and Environment Canterbury to resolve this issue at the earliest opportunity, but there are a number of factors to consider and this will take time. To address the increased nitrate levels, Council are committed to building a denitrification plant – purposely designed to remove nitrate at the water source. However, this is a not a short term fix and will take many months to finalise design, obtain consents and build

Therefore, until nitrate concentrations return to compliant levels, it is strongly advised to access safe drinking water from the following three locations:

- Glenavy Hall, SH 1, Glenavy
- · Morven Hall, MacLean Street, Morven
- · Victoria Park potable water tap on Hillary Street, Waimate

### WHAT ABOUT MY PETS?

During this nitrate advisory, we recommend household pets be given the potable drinking water. While cats and dogs can handle a higher level of nitrates than most people, it's advisable to err on the side of caution when providing their water intake. If you have any further queries or issues relating to animals, please speak with your local vet.

## WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

We acknowledge this news will come as a shock to scheme users, and we want you all to have an opportunity to better understand the situation at hand. Therefore, we will be hosting a public meeting at the Glenavy Hall on Saturday 10 September from 1.30pm.

At this meeting, we will have representatives from Council, Environment Canterbury and a remote address from the Canterbury Chief Medical Officer of Health Matthew Reid. This will be an open workshop forum for you to ask any questions, establish the facts and get further detail on the short to medium term landscape looking ahead.

We sincerely appreciate the inconvenience caused and are doing everything we can to restore safe drinking water through the scheme in the coming months.
